The image of the shepherd is not one that we are really familiar with in our culture today, but it was very familiar to those whom Jesus spoke too. Also, the image of the shepherd goes back into the Old Testament with the stories of David.

We will explore this image in more detail during worship, yet let me bring out some of the aspects of what Jesus says here.

A bit of foreshadowing to the crucifixion but also talking about the second that he protects the sheep. The imagery of Psalm 23 and the rod and staff of the shepherd come through strongly. The third thing and the basis of all is that Jesus cares for us and knows us and who we are. He knows our name and hopefully we listen to him.

Jesus as the Good Shepherd shows us the unconditional love and deep care that Jesus has for us sheep, and hopefully helps us to want to follow more closely.

Thank you, Good Shepherd for your love and care for us. May we listen deeper as you call and lead us to green pastures and quiet waters. Amen.

The clerk smiled at me, "Your dad has been coming in and making payments on it too. You don't owe anything!" What a wonderful gift that was. I was debt free!

When the Savior redeems us, our sins are paid for. I find myself remembering mistakes I have made, things I have done wrong. I don't need to do that. The debt is paid. Just as my dear father paid for my warm winter coat, my Heavenly Father paid the debt for my sins.

Our family is one that weeps easily. My oldest sister said once, "How can people see that picture of Christ on the cross without crying." I have told the Easter story to so many children over the years, and when I cry, many of them used to cry along with me." The tears are for the pain Jesus suffered, and tears for our sins, that helped to put him on the cross. But then come the grateful tears

when we realize what Christ did for us. He redeemed us. He paid the price for us, we are "debt free."

At Easter what a time of rejoicing we experience. We are redeemed.

After the wind there was an earthquake, but the Lord was not in the earthquake. After the earthquake came a fire, but the Lord was not in the fire. And after the fire came a gentle whisper. 1 Kings 19:11-12 (NIV)

MARY

At this, she turned around and saw Jesus standing there, but she did not realize that it was Jesus. He asked her, "Woman, why are you crying? Who is it you are looking for?" Thinking he was the gardener, she said, "Sir, if you have carried him away, tell me where you have put him, and I will get him." Jesus said to her, "Mary." She turned toward him and cried out in Aramaic, "Rabboni!" (which means "Teacher"). John 20:14-16

This is my favorite telling of the Easter morning. Mary had gone to the tomb and found it empty. She returned and told the disciples what she had found. Peter and John ran to the tomb and found it empty and then returned home. Mary stayed. She saw and talked with angels. She saw Jesus and thought He was the gardener. But nothing made sense until Jesus spoke her name. A simple, "Mary, and her eyes and heart were opened. She recognized Jesus and that He was alive! She began to worship and then Jesus sent her back to the disciples to tell them what she had just experienced.

Maybe it was the sound of Jesus' voice. Maybe it was the way He said her name. Maybe it was simply hearing her name. Whatever the reason, Jesus saying her name broke her out of the grief she was in following Jesus' death. She experienced the resurrected Jesus and was brought into new life.

A simple calling of her name changed her life.

As we have seen during this season of Lent, God knows our name and calls us each day into a new life each day. May we continue to hear God's voice lovingly calling our name each day as we live a new life in God.
